

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How is the volume of a qualification specified?

- COUNCIL ON HIGHER EDUCATION
- Qualifications are compared by level of complexity using Level Descriptors that describe levels of: *Knowledge, Skills* and *Competences*
- All qualifications are assigned a Credit Value indicating the volume of learning
- 1 credit = 10 notional hours of learning activity for an *average* learner
- Credit is a *notional* value and can include:
 - ➤Class time
 - ➢Lectures
 - Project work
 - ► Laboratory work
 - ≻Homework
 - Assessment

Interphase bwn Quality Assurance and LQF



- Programmes offered by universities and colleges are quality assured by CHE using Minimum Programme Accreditation Standards
- The standards are aligned to the Lesotho Qualifications Framework (LQF) including in the following areas:

➢ programme design,

>level at which the programme is pitched,

Learning outcomes and assessment,

➤Staffing.

- Institutions submit their programmes (new & existing) to CHE for review towards accreditation. If they meet minimum standards they granted accreditation.
- Once a programme is accredited it is registered on the LQF by CHE.

How Learning Outcomes Contribute in Placement



- Learning Outcomes (LOs) are central in the specification of qualifications for the LQF.
- LOs provide information on the knowledge, skills and competences that will be achieved on successful completion of a qualification,
- All qualifications on the LQF specify Learning Outcomes appropriate to the Level Descriptor and specific to the qualification
- There are broad Learning Outcomes at the qualification level and unit/module/course based specific Learning Outcomes
- Learners' performance is assessed against the specific LOs

Levelling Qualifications on the LQF



- When determining the LQF Level of a qualification or part-qualification, the following compliance elements are critical:
 - Ensuring alignment with the level descriptors in terms of depth, breadth, complexity and volume of learning
 - Specific learning outcomes (attached to units/courses/modules) must lead to the attainment of the attributes in the qualification level outcomes.
- The LQF level descriptors are used along with other sources of information to determine the level of a qualification.
- These include subject benchmarks, qualifications at the same level, and comparable qualifications on other frameworks.

Levelling Cont.



 Determining the level on LQF is influenced mainly by the learning outcomes and assessment methods, and other factors such as:

Complexity and depth of knowledge and understanding;
Degree of independence and creativity;
Range of sophistication in application and practice; and
Role taken in relation to others in carrying out tasks.

• Once the levels of all units of a qualification are determined the overall LQF level of the qualification can be assigned.

Validation of Qualifications



A qualification is valid when it is specified using LQF validation criteria, including:

- Title
- Purpose
- Level
- Credit value
- Structure
- Learning Outcomes
- Assessment criteria
- Accreditation by CHE





 It is the responsibility of institutions to determine the level of a qualification before it is submitted to CHE for review

• CHE validates that a qualification is placed at an appropriate level through a quality assurance mechanism that leads to accreditation

• So, accreditation is a prerequisite for a qualification to be registered

• Once a qualification has been accredited it is registered on the LQF
